### ⇒ Charitable Donations





## HELPING HANDS OF ROUND POND MISSION STATEMENT

The Helping Hands of Round Pond, a 501(c)(3) nonprofit, is dedicated to providing support to the local community, focusing on the village of Round Pond, through outreach, social events, and educational programming. The historic Meetinghouse is the home of the Helping Hands of Round Pond and provides an inclusive community gathering space for all.

Dear Friends of the Round Pond Meetinghouse and Supporters of the Helping Hands,

As you drive through Round Pond this week, you will notice some activity at the Meetinghouse. Scaffolding is going up, and soon carpenters will be at work repairing the facade of the building. Once the carpenters are done, painters will come on site and finish their part of the project to restore the front of the building, including the plinth and the steeple.

We write to you today to update you on the recent activities of the Helping Hands. 2023 saw the completion of several important building projects at the Meetinghouse, including the installation of a new roof, the removal of an old chimney and surrounding repairs, the removal of the palladium window for restoration, and substantial work to the electrical system. While this work was underway we continued to raise funds and pursue grants. In January 2024 we were awarded a \$60,000 matching grant from the Maine Steeples Fund; these funds are allowing us to move forward with our spring and summer construction projects. Looking beyond the summer of 2024, we will soon be in a good position to organize and raise funds for the next phase of construction. After an architectural engineer stepped forward and agreed to do a *pro bono* structural review, we now have the information we need to plan for repairing the foundation of the structure. Rebuilding the underpinnings will undoubtedly be the most significant undertaking in the restoration of the Meetinghouse.

The Community Service Committee continues to be the heart of our organization. Even without a functioning building to call its own, our hearty troop of volunteers works tirelessly throughout the year to raise funds needed to support the residents of Round Pond and bring the community together at important times. We planned bake sales and food sales every season of the year, and had a strong presence on the lawn of the Meetinghouse at the Round Pond Fourth of July Parade. We participated in spring clean-up days, celebrated summer with a free ice-cream social (co-sponsored by Camden National Bank), and decorated the village with wreaths and a lighted tree for the winter season. We gathered information and published a local resource guide of social services; we welcomed new residents to the village, and gave support to those who were ill or shut-in, or who had recently lost family members. And at its final committee meeting in December 2023, we distributed over \$3800 to local organizations that serve Round Pond and share our vision of serving the bodies, hearts, minds, and spirits of our local coastal community.

We are excited for everything that the coming months will bring. While we are eagerly following the construction project now underway, we are also getting ready for more public events,

fundraisers, and community activities. Mary Boothby has generously contributed to our efforts by designing and painting a beautiful lighthouse sign that will track our fundraising progress. We are working on a new Helping Hands of Round Pond cookbook, and in July we will be hosting an evening benefit with Round Pond resident and public historian Heather Cox Richardson - stay tuned for details!

If you are not yet in Round Pond for the summer season, we look forward to seeing you soon. And when you drive by the Meetinghouse, look for the lighthouse, and look up at the facade and join us as we all watch the changes unfold.
